Everyone was looking forward to being a part of history! Both the Hershey Bears and the Adirondack Phantoms were playing in their first outdoor game in what has become one of the AHL's signature annual events.

## A Tribute to Dennis Leger 1951-2012



## Monarchs Boosters lose one of their own

Father... Hockey Fan... USPS Employee... Friend

Hal Collins, 56, of Manchester, NH, died January 6, 2012, at Elliot Hospital, surrounded by his loving family, after a long illness.

Hal was a loving and devoted father. Family members include four children; Jessica Marshall, Jesse Hussey, Bronson Collins, and Olivia Collins; his brother, James Collins; and his sister, Regina Collins.

Hal was born on October 9, 1955, the youngest of three children of Rufus and Orilia (Richards) Collins.

His sister Regina remembers when Hal was just a young boy of around 10 years old. He'd had his tonsils removed at the hospital in Salem and, on their way home from the hospital, his mother decided to stop at the grocery store to get some food that would be easy



for Hall to eat. She asked Hal what kind of ice cream he'd like. Unable to speak due to the soreness of his throat, Hal rubbed his finger on his mother's cheek: Chocolate!!

As a youngster, he was very enterprising and had a good business sense. He designed some business cards for himself, and went around to various Salem businesses handing them out and telling the business owners he could do odd jobs for them. Before he knew it, he was gainfully employed by many of the local store owners, delivering packages, doing small jobs when they asked, and running errands for them. He enjoyed making a few dollars here and there and making new friends.

In high school, he participated in school activities and was active as business manager of the high school yearbook. He graduated from Bishop Fenwick High School, Peabody, MA. In 1977, he earned a bachelor of arts degree from Springfield College, where he graduated summa cum laude. His major at Springfield was in Community Leadership and Business Development. He certainly had groomed himself well for it with his entrepreneurship as a youngster!

Hal worked at the YMCA in several locations following college and

was always very interested in the activities that the Y provided for youngsters, and the guidance it gave to help kids grow up to be productive adults.

After working in several managerial capacities for the YMCA, Hal managed a Nashua movie theater. His daughter Jessica remembers going to the theater with him and hiding in the "candy room"... likely a pretty fun place for a kid to hide!

Hal was deaf in his right ear, a result of German measles when he was young. As Hal's children and his sister Regina sat down to talk about what might he nice for people to read about in this memorial leaf-




let, his daughter Olivia suddenly had a revelation about his deafness. Sometimes when Olivia wanted to talk to her Dad about something, he'd say "wait till we're in the car." Olivia would talk to her father from the passenger seat (on his right side...). He often wouldn't answer or respond. Later, when she'd talk to him again about the same topic, he would have no clue what she was talking about. Aha! She'd been talking on his right side, and he wasn't hearing it!

Since 1998, Hal was a letter carrier with the United States Postal Service, a job that he enjoyed, and with coworkers that he loved. That was one thing you could always depend on with Hal. Even if he hardly knew you, he quickly became a friend, and his friends had great love and respect for him.

He was an avid hockey fan, particularly of the Manchester Monarchs. At hockey games, Hal was the go-to guy for all the most recent news on player trades, who was in a "PTO" and "ATO", and he knew minute details about not only the Monarchs, but many other AHL and NHL teams and players as well.

He was a member of the Manchester Monarchs Booster Club from its inception in 2003 and had served in several volunteer capacities in the club, most recently as Trip Coordinator.
